"Smo", "bonknhoot", "WINSTON\_4" and "MustangMark" tacked West of the Island, "zero", "Henrys", "CollegeFund" and "rumskib" kept sailing and tacked East of the Island.

I really thought that the group that tacked sooner would lose big.

Well, not so much, the final leaderboard shows both groups of boats alternating positions. "Smo" who tacked sooner beat "zero" who tacked East, followed by "MustangMark" that tacked West, then "Henrys" that tacked East, and so on. Really interesting.
