

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I had been looking forward to this Race because it was on the Great Lakes. It being close to home I particularly wanted the Canadians to place well. As many of you know, and as was talked about in the Chatroom, the November gales of Lake Superior on the big lake they call Gitcha Gumee are well known and particularly so because of the Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald and Gordon Lightfoot's haunting song about the sinking of this bulk carrier on November 10, 1975 and the loss of its crew of 29.

While I sail on the Great Lakes in my on-the-water boat **Shibumi**, I have not sailed on Lake Superior and I am not sure that I would want to as late as November!

In the hope of performing well I did more advance preparation than usual. While I did not live up to my delusions of grandeur I am proud of **Satori's** performance. As a relative newcomer to SOL, coming on board for the N2B Race in June, a 7th place finish was encouraging to me and I hope will inspire all of you SOLers who are learning about SOL and QtVIm (Qt) like me. I even had my 5 minutes of glory 265 nms into the Race by being in first place while rounding Michipicoten Island.....but I did overestimate the time! **WRmirekd** was even kind enough to give **Satori** a second chance along the north shore of the Island!

This was a close race with an exciting finish as we in the EST Time Zone sailed on SOL in the dark of early morning, while navigating through the Apostle Islands. As **Vibex** said in the Chatroom this would have been a nightmare finish IRL. The rest of you may not have noticed that it was dark! **WRmirekd**, not a stranger to the Podium and last year's winner, led **rumskib**, another Podium regular, by just 31 seconds, with **Wolff** following in another 20 seconds to complete the Podium. How close is that after 65 hours and 572.17 nms? Congratulations to them. Actually only 6 minutes and 40 seconds separated the Top Ten. There was almost no room for mistakes and unfortunately I made a few after Michipicoten Island! The timing of the WX reports did not help! They seemed to arrive at the most inopportune times in the Race!

In advance of the race I went to the Archives of SOL to see the Reports on last year's race including **Bimmer's** time-lapsed video of that race. http://www.sailonline.org/blog/2019/nov/28/lake-superior-lights-2019-results/. Always worthwhile knowing how last year's race went. The Reports of winner **WRmirekd** and **bonknhoot** were particularly informative and influenced my thinking in this my first participation in this Race which has been raced by SOLers for over 10 years. I had a look at the charts of the Apostle Islands since I knew that they would likely feature in the start, although in the end they did not, but they certainly featured in the finish. I was particularly pleased that the latest version of Qt did, in fact, avoid coasts in most of my routings.


I thought that the 265 nms of open water to Michipicoten Island would provide the opportunity for the Leaders and this turned out to be true for about 20 boats including **Satori** and the winners. I thought that the other shorter Legs where we all had to come back together to round a Mark were less likely to provide an opportunity of time and miles. While I was using a Qt routing, which I not only updated at each WX, I also produced new routings between each WX. At the same time I was looking ahead at the weather on SOL, using the 24 hour predictor line setting as recommended by **Zorba777** and watching the competition just like IRL. You know who the usual suspects are who have a high chance of being on the Podium! I don't think there is any shame in wondering why they are doing what they are doing. I am not talking about hitching to their stern and not racing my own race. What weather are they

searching for? At the same time I am conscious of the Ensign they are flying and the Time Zone they live in and whether they will be attending to WX Reports in the middle of their night. As I and others have said before "long-distance races are won and lost at night"! As **Zorba777** said in the Chatroom he was not the one to be following in this Race since he was not going to wake for the middle of the night WX!

How **Satori** played the huge header to the north on the first Leg was going to dictate. This was the time for the SOL Ruler and paper and pencil and triangles to see if boat speed and increased distance would be better than a more direct route to Michipicoten Island. How far do I take the header to the north? Yes, I had Qt to guide me with routings, which is a big advantage, but I still have trouble discarding what I would have to be doing if I was sailing by the SOMPs. There was a multitude of views on the best route, even among those using Qt, because the north/south chorus line ultimately spread out over some 30 nms. The Top 10/20 boats were closely grouped all through this Leg and farther north than most. Oh, and don't look at the SOL DTF ranking! The ultimate Leaders were far enough away from the Rhumbline to be ranked in 90's at this point.


I thought that the next major decision was going to be whether to route north or south of Isle Royale after rounding the Passage Island Light which Qt said **Satori** was going to arrive at around 20:24 UTC. How nice, just 21 minutes before the next WX. Will **Satori** be committed to the north or south? Will the WX suggest that it was not the best route? Will I be able to change? Well that is exactly what happened! I had a route south of the Island and north was now the favoured route. Fortunately, I was not so committed that I could not change to pass Isle Royale on the north side as I did but it required a course change.

I saw from last year's Report of **WRmirekd** that there were at least 3 routes through the Apostle Islands to the Finish Line as the Leaders jockeyed for position.




As you know that is exactly what happened this year as well and made for an exciting finish. And, wouldn't you know it, the 08:45 WX was coming out while we were passing through the Islands! Is there someone in SOL with a mischievous mind who can plan this well? I abandoned the Qt route, as I think most of the Leaders did, got on the helm and covered the competition. On the following Screen Prints you can see what transpired. Qt had **Satori** sailing the westerly (red) route, a number chose the easterly (yellow) route outside the Islands in a last minute attempt to improve their position. I chose the (green) route in between as did **WRmirekd**. Most who did so maintained their position. **rafa** stayed in the westerly (red) route perhaps influenced by the fact that in the Chatroom he was said to have tried the easterly (yellow) route last year to no avail. I had my SOL ruler in use checking the comparative distances of each of the routes to round the Chequamegon Point Light to Port.


Now the race. Here is a Screen Print 5 hours and 14 minutes and 42 nms into the race. Fortunately the best route to Michipicoten Island did not take us through the Apostle Islands. Notice how the fleet has fanned out! Apparently as many ideas as there are boats! You will see that I have the Setting for the Predictor Line at 24 hours, a suggestion made by **Zorba777** in one of his Reports. Here you can see from where the COG and TWA predictor lines cross that sailing TWA was 2 hours longer than the COG course but it did come into play in **Satori's** routing, but later rather than earlier, taking **Satori** north.




Here is a Qt Screen Print at 03:35 UTC 8 hours and 35 minutes into the Race and 50 minutes after the last 09:45 WX. The Purple dotted line is the Qt Pathway I set up for the whole race course. The Orange line is the Qt route using the Pathway. The Green line is the route from the start to POI 010 the first mark on the Pathway placed at the west end of Michipicoten Island and is the route that **Satori** is sailing. I chose to use this route because I wanted to manually helm Satori around the north shore of Michipicoten Island as close to the shore line as possible, a must do according to **WRmirekd** in his Report on last year's race. This paid off because twice **Satori** was in first place along the shore line and, if you can believe it, ahead of **WRmirekd**....but not for long! You can see how the wind veering to the north factored into the routing.




Here is the SOL Screen Print at the same time first in low resolution.




Here in higher resolution. This is only 87 nms into the Race but you are looking at the ultimate Leaders.




Here is a Screen Print 13 hours 49 minutes and 137 nms into the Race after the 08:45 UTC WX. You can see that the bulk of the fleet is to the south of **Satori**. The winds shown are 4.9 hrs ahead. Higher winds and a more direct route to Michipicoten Island but ultimately they will prove to be 1 to 2 hours behind **Satori**! Screens following may tell you why, if there are lessons to be learned by those sailing by SOMPs!




Here in higher resolution are the Leaders at the same point in time.




Here is a Qt Screen Print with a new Red route that Satori is sailing after the 08:45 UTC WX.




Here 5 hours later are the Top Ten heading north-east to gybe to Michipicoten Island.




Here is a Qt Screen Print at the same time. Satori is sailing the Blue route.




Here after the gybe to Michipicoten Island the chorus line covers 30 nms. The ones farthest south are 1 hour behind.




Are these the leaders? We will know at Michipicoten Island in 10 hours!




I did a routing for Tyger and his ETA at the West Island Mark is 02:08 UTC 23 minutes behind Satori.





Here are the Leaders about 52 nms from Michipicoten Island. rafa is closer to the rhumbline.




28 minutes later here are the Leaders approaching Michipicoten Island.









Here are the Leaders 4 hrs and 34 minutes later having rounded the Caribou Island Light. **WRmirekd** has maintained the lead 32 nms after Michipicoten Island and is now 0.31 nms ahead of **Satori**. To my surprise **FreyjaUSA** went down the west side of Caribou Island in the stronger winds and curved back around the Caribou Island Light and in the process got just ahead of **Satori**. A lead of one place that he was able to maintain all the way to the Finish Line.




Here is the Qt blue route that **Satori** is sailing.




After rounding the Stannard Rock Light another header starting in about an hour. There is some shuffling among the Top Ten.




Here is the same screen in higher resolution.




Here is the Qt screen at the same time with a new orange route for **Satori** that changes the routing from north of Isle Royale to south.




An hour and 23 minutes later after the 14:45 UTC WX Satori is now sailing this new Blue Qt route.




Here is the SOL screen at the same time showing the continuing header.






Here are the ones leading on the north side of Isle Royale with a 115 nms to go.




With 65 nms to go and as I said in the Chatroom I am just recovering from a Qt crash!




Here are the Leaders approaching the Outer Island Light. The Podium positions are established with 32 nms to go.




The Leaders have split taking one of the three routes through the Apostle Islands described on the Chart on Page 4.




Approaching Chequamegon Point Light. The bets are on....!






What is the shortest route to the Finish Line? Can Satori get there ahead of FreyjaUSA?




Another 2 nms!
