


WS in chat pre-race: Is this the way our Scandinavian SOLer's spend their winters? Designing courses such as this? Madness.

I recall a drunken lunch with Smo at the X, luckily the first of only a couple BBQs.




First Leg

Tuesday 0311 UTC Monday, 11:11 PM ET


WS saw a glimmer of light and here, at 11pm local, I was setting up for the overnight more offshore in better wind.

The podium is magically already in sequence although separated by some miles.


It is unusual in SOLraces that things get so spread out, and greater spreads were to come.

It was noted that Rafa was just simply not sleeping!




Tuesday 0751 UTC Tuesday 3:51 AM ET





Tuesday 1028 UTC Tuesday 6:28 AM ET

It worked, I was up early enough that I'd been there only a few minutes. I lost little and carried on.








Tuesday 17:46 UTC Tuesday 1:46 PM ET

Memories are fuzzy at this stage but there are some options in the tracks.


I work from home and in the midst of designs, budgets, proposals, and zoom calls I peer over at my race laptop to see what I've missed.

I always set my phone timer and safety DCs so if an emergency came up, I could be reminded or be somewhat assured I'd still be in the ballpark, even if BBQ'd.




How could it still be Tuesday? The legs aren't too long and boat speed in in the +-9kt range so the turns come fast.


I'm as bleary doing this report as I was racing!

Wednesday 0742 UTC / Wednesday 3:42 AM ET




Follow the leader we did not, and this sieve of islands took its toll, particularly on Rafa who must have collapsed from exhaustion.

Skua, Brellis, AL53SSIta, ARMOROCH, and WS followed Taff, the new leader, who had a comfortable margin.





The Korpo rounding.

I considered it, you can see my ruler lines, but he did it and leap frogged into 4th ahead of me.



WS was awake for this critical rounding and it paid off moving from 5th to 3rd as my comrades took their eyes off the ball.




Finito
