Singapore Visit 2021 Report

Due to my university studies and the pandemic, I decided to take a year-long break from Sailonline to give priority to my studies.

Now that I have just recently completed my studies and graduated, I have a lot more time on my hands and decided to make my return to Sailonline. At first, I was very nervous, and everything seemed to be very "foreign" to me as the website had a completely different UI (User Interface) that I had never seen or experienced before.

I decided that I would sail my own race and not follow or cover anyone. As the race started my brain became completely "scattered" as I saw all the boats going off in different directions, something I had to get used to again after being away for almost a year. I stuck to my game plan and once we were about halfway to the Pulau Tioman rounding I was in the groove and was used to everything again, it almost felt as if I did not even leave.

After rounding the Pulau Tioman mark I knew for a fact that I was in a very good position and that my game plan was working, however, I then started making the "rusty" mistakes. I sent a command to change my course by a few degrees on a TWA course and it had a sneaky minus in front of the TWA degree and my boat ended up completely gybing. I lost quite a few positions due to my performance loss and knew that I had to sail my own race again to get those positions back. The rest of the leg to Kampung Gambut went relatively smoothly and I had worked my way back into a podium position, which I was very surprised by.

The last leg to the finish was a very exciting one, firstly I had to decide which side of the finish line was the better side to sail to and I had NagaJolokia hot on my heels. I decided that I would aim for the starboard side of the finish line, set my DC's and watched. I, unfortunately, could not hold NagaJolokia back, but I managed to secure my 3rd position on the podium! I was very surprised by this as it had been so long since I had sailed a race and it felt great knowing that I was back and had not lost my touch!

All in all, there are a lot of things that I had to relearn from the mistakes I made:

- The main one was that your boat needs to be at 100% performance before setting a DC, I made this mistake way too often and sat there like a clown wondering why my boat was not turning when I wanted it to LOL.
- The second thing that I had to relearn was that if it is late in the evening and your boat does not need to be adjusted for a few hours, get some sleep! I often found myself sitting there watching all the boats and being too tired when it came to the crucial parts of the race, not being able to concentrate.
- The third thing was that I very quickly realized that I needed to do what I always used to do, which was creating a boat list with just myself in it. This way I can create a game plan and stick to it, if I don't do this then when I see most of the fleet going in a different direction I often second guess myself.

I would just like to say thank you to everyone at Sailonline for the great race. It was truly a breath of fresh air making my return and it was great reuniting with the amazing community that SOL has.
