Race Report

Kamchatsky to Tromsoe

July 18th

Even the route conjures up images of Russian composers; a masterpiece by Rimsky-Korsakov perhaps!

This was however 4259Nm across Russia and Norway and no Flight of the Bumble Bee that was for sure.

The start saw some of the usual suspects jockeying for early places. CriticalHippo was off on one of his unusual angles; south south east while most headed east by north east trying to escape light winds but at least heading in the right direction

The early leaders were Garagiste, QMaxx. HappyHour, wsguerin, Go4iT and myself. Apologies if I have forgotten some skippers as two new races are in progress and my memory fades! We swapped places heading up the Bering Sea, looking forward to sea ice once we cleared Cape Dezhnev. Mostly I set Wrangel Island as my target until well into the Arctic Sea.

CriticalHippo was joined by a few others lured by stronger winds but were about 30 miles behind as we left the Bering Sea.

As we cleared Cape Chelyuskin, we were on the downhill run to Tromsoe; or so we thought. The "bouncers" suddenly showed as leading which was rather an unpleasant way to start the day for those of us smugly expecting to sail on to Novaya Zemlya and only focused on beating QMaxx or wsguerin or HappyHour.
